Minister's letter

The first thing to mention is a reminder about the services being held this coming Holy Week. On Palm/Passion Sunday (24th March) there will be input from the young people who are meeting monthly as 'Film Crew". This is

always something to which one can look forward! Hopefully there will also be some participation on the day from S-Club. During Holy Week there are some MCT services. There is a 7pm service on Tuesday (26th March) in the Garden of the Church of the Good Shepherd and a 7pm service of communion at Saughtonhall UR Church on Maundy Thursday (28th March).

On Good Friday (29th March) there will be a joint service with our Church of Scotland neighbours from Gorgie and Palmerston Place Church (GAPP) and St Stephen's Comely Bank



Church which will be held at Murrayfield at 7pm. Please do consider whether you can attend, on this important day in the church calendar.

On Easter Sunday (31st March) there will be a joyful Sunday morning service which (as usual for Easter) will include a celebration of communion. It is hoped that we will also have an Easter Choir this year. Any singers are very welcome (and encouraged) to join. The choir will contribute during the services on Palm/Passion Sunday (24th March), Good Friday (29th March 12.30pm) and Easter Sunday (31st March). The second thing to draw to your attention is that the Kirk Session has very recently considered a Three Year Strategic Plan for the congregation. There has been a recent history of strategic plans the latest of which ran from 2015-2020. These help to shape our priorities and guide our activities. Normally there would have been a plan to run from 2020-2025 but the Covid pandemic intervened. Presently, taking cognisance of the shifts within the Presbytery, a three year plan was

It has taken longer than expected to produce this Three Year Plan (2024 - 2027)! Originally I had hoped it would be ready by last autumn. The format replicates the 2015-2020 plan and adopts various categories that were used in Church of Scotland Local Church Review documentation. The areas covered are: Worship, Discipleship, Service, Evangelism, Fellowship, Ministry Team, Property, Stewardship, Communication, and Committee Structure. The end product is reasonably lengthy but at the same time it is not difficult to digest.

Once this is published on the website (printed copies can be requested from the office) myself and the Kirk Session would like to receive feedback and comments. Please send over any remarks to me or to one of the session clerks (contact details on pg 25). In particular we would like to hear if you have any other ideas, and whether or not you think the proposals are heading along the right lines. Please feel free also to speak to me or one of the session clerks if there is anything you would like to discuss in person.

The landscape at the moment has many challenges and we need to face them with a prayerful vision and an orderly sense of purpose. Hopefully the Three Year Plan can help us take some positive steps. Undoubtedly achieving the proposals will require some sacrificial hard work and some boldness and participation from as many of our church members as possible. Getting there will also require us to keep our faith in the God of Easter who raised Jesus from the dead and who gave the Spirit of the resurrection as a gift for the church.

Thursday of Holy Week at 7pm: a communion service at Saughtonhall United Reformed Church. This will follow a Tennebrae format.




Good Friday 2pm: Liturgy of the Cross service at the Church of the Good Shepherd

Edinburgh Prison Christmas Gift Scheme

Dearest Friends.

Thank you for your kindness and generosity. Every child that visited the visitors centre during the time leading up to Christmas received a gift, whether their parents or guardians requested them or not. This year three hundred and twenty-eight children from one hundred and twenty-six families had a Christmas present to open on Christmas morning due to your kindness and generosity. Many adults also received presents

from the gift collection but again we did not take note of the

Every child where possible received a toy, an activity gift and book, and of course something nice. More than a thousand gifts were given out.

It is impossible to measure the difference that your kindness and generosity makes to these children. I cannot thank you enough for what you do. I feel proud and privileged to be part of such a special group of people.

The gifts were distributed through five Christmas parties in the visits room of the prison organised through the visitor's centre and family contact officers. Gifts were also given out directly through the visitor's centre.

My thanks as always go to Shona and Patrizia and the other staff in the visitor's centre for their help in making sure the gifts go to the correct families. My thanks also go to one of my colleague's family contact Officer Rebecca Brown who when off duty was to be found helping in the visitor's centre. 

News from the Pastoral Group

Pastoral Group activities were many over the festive period. We held a very successful tea party in early December, attended by some 25 members and friends. Cards were delivered around the parish giving details of church services and our charity collections. Members on our 'pastoral list' received Christmas Cards signed by Keith (minister). Our Christmas charitable activities were once again very successful. A huge number of cans/perishable goods were handed over to the Edinburgh Food Project, £325 (£405 including Gift Aid) was donated to Edinburgh Women's Aid and a significant number of gifts were donated to HMP Edinburgh (thanks go to St George's School who supported this activity). TTT had a winter break and restarted for a spring term on 6th February. We look forward to the employment of a Pastoral Assistant who we hope will take an active part in TTT and other activities and will work with the Pastoral Group in the care of our congregation. The group's next main focus will be Easter.







Our Karate Club - Edinburgh Karate Shizen has been running Shotokan Karate classes since 2012. ECHOES OF CELTIC CHRISTIANITY BY TIMOTHY M PITT


