Welcome to the December edition of the magazine

Minister's letter *Rev Keith Graham*

"Let me encourage you this Advent to set aside a few moments each day to read and re-read a few Psalms. Let them speak deeply to your own personal circumstances".

I returned to work, after a few months off unwell, at the end of June. Since then the Sunday sermons have largely been based upon a selection of Psalms from the Old Testament. There are 150 Psalms in total and these are divided into five 'books'. Almost all of the Psalms used as the main text over the last five months came from Book 1 (Psalms 1-41). The Psalms covered were: 1, 2, 8, 11, 13, 14, 15, 16, 19, 22, 23, 24, 27, 30, 32, 37, 109.

The Psalms are such a very rich portion of scripture. They cover the gamut of human emotions which makes them very accessible and perhaps explains their enduring popularity in the church. It is a common experience to read a Psalm and feel it speaking directly into a personal situation even though the original poem was written thousands of years ago. Most of the Psalms are fairly short and easy to read (with a few exceptions) although they also repay careful re-reading.

This coming Sunday brings the series on Psalms to a conclusion. It does so with an Advent flourish with Psalm 40 (with a sideways look at a famous Irish rock band who sing part of the Psalm!). Psalm 40 starts with the line: 'I waited patiently for the Lord' (NRSV). The Message translation puts it: 'I waited and waited and waited for God'. As it turns out many of the Psalms content are heavy with a sense of waiting, of asking 'How long?'

On the first Sunday of Advent the sermon text was Psalm 37 which urges 'Be still before the Lord, and wait patiently for him'. Waiting sums up well these weeks before Christmas. Families can get very excited as the doors on the Advent



Calendars are opened and as the 25th December draws closer. The supermarkets and shops and newspapers contribute to the anticipation by working up a frenzy of all the things we need to organise (and buy).

Let me encourage you this Advent to set aside a few moments each day to read and re-read a few Psalms. Let them speak deeply to your own personal circumstances. Perhaps you might also like to read them considering how they tap into that sense of waiting which infuses the season of Advent. Use them as an aid to focus not just on the coming celebration of the birth of Jesus but also to focus on waiting expectantly for Christ coming again.

In a world where much has gone wrong it sometimes takes a bit of prayerful concentration to hope for the healing and renewal of Christ's eternal kingdom. For any of you who are fond of Taize chants you might enjoy listening, this Advent, to 'Wait for the Lord' by Jacques Berthier. The refrain is lifted from Psalm 27: 'Wait for the Lord whose day is near. Wait for the Lord:

be strong, take heart!'. You can listen to it by clicking on this image.

The sale of our pots of bulbs, hyacinth and tete a tete bulbs has gone very well and a big thank you to all of you who have participated. We have made approx £425 so a very good total.

I think most of you know that this money will go towards the water bore hole project that Esther is commencing.

When Esther was visiting us in August she spoke to us about the possibility of drilling a bore hole in the grounds of the school, to provide water for the school and surrounding community.

At the moment they have to buy all the water they use and as you can imagine that is an expensive business.

Her idea is that if they can put down a pipe to water and pump it up they could have their own water supply. This will be an expensive and long term project but we felt, if we could, we should try and support this to happen even if our contribution from Murrayfield Churches Together is small - every little helps to achieve the goal. It will have to be done in stages with first a hydro geological survey done which has found water at 300 metres underground. They have to obtain permits, drilling work, submersible water pumps and many more processes before they can bring water to the surface for their use.

What's going on in the Church Centre? In this edition we are delighted to highlight : The Edinburgh Gilbert and Sullivan Society *Gillian Robertson: EDGAS president*

A great resource for the congregation and a place for building links with our local community

This year, Edinburgh Gilbert and Sullivan Society (EDGAS) have been celebrating our centenary year - 100 years of performing and appreciating the wonderful, joyful works of W.S Gilbert and Sir Arthur Sullivan! This is a huge achievement as we've managed to survive throughout times of war, economic crisis, global pandemics - the list goes on!

EDGAS was originally set up as an appreciation society and was formed at the North British Station Hotel (now the Waldorf Astoria owned Balmoral Hotel). This was following the formation of the London G&S Society in the Spring of 1924, and on Thursday 18th December 1924, 80 people gathered in the hotel (at 4.30pm) to hear Dr Thomas Stephenson declare that Edinburgh should have a society dedicated to the works of Gilbert and Sullivan. And thus, our society was born.

Since that historical meeting in 1924, EDGAS has evolved considerably, regularly performing full-scale productions of the works of Gilbert and Sullivan in Edinburgh and beyond.

We have two natural homes, one of those is the beautiful Kings Theatre in Tollcross (which we hope to return to in 2026, following extensive and necessary renovations). The other is your large hall at the Murrayfield Parish Church, where we work hard to put our large and complex productions together. Your hall is the perfect size, as it's big enough to mark out the size of the stage that we will perform

on, and gives us plenty of 'wing space' to move around when waiting to rehearse! It makes such a difference to have that kind of space, particularly when we're practicing our large dance numbers! We also keep our piano in

your hall - you may have noticed it in the corner, under the stage!

Having spoken with a few of our 'longer term' members, we reckon we've been using the space at MPC for at least 25 years, so perhaps we should be celebrating our relationship with your excellent facility too!.

We are currently rehearsing our production of 'The Sorceror', which we will be performing 9th - 12th April next year. 'The Sorcerer' is a wonderfully silly story involving love potions gone wrong and memorable songs. We've managed to secure a brilliant cast and chorus and would love for you to come and see us. 


