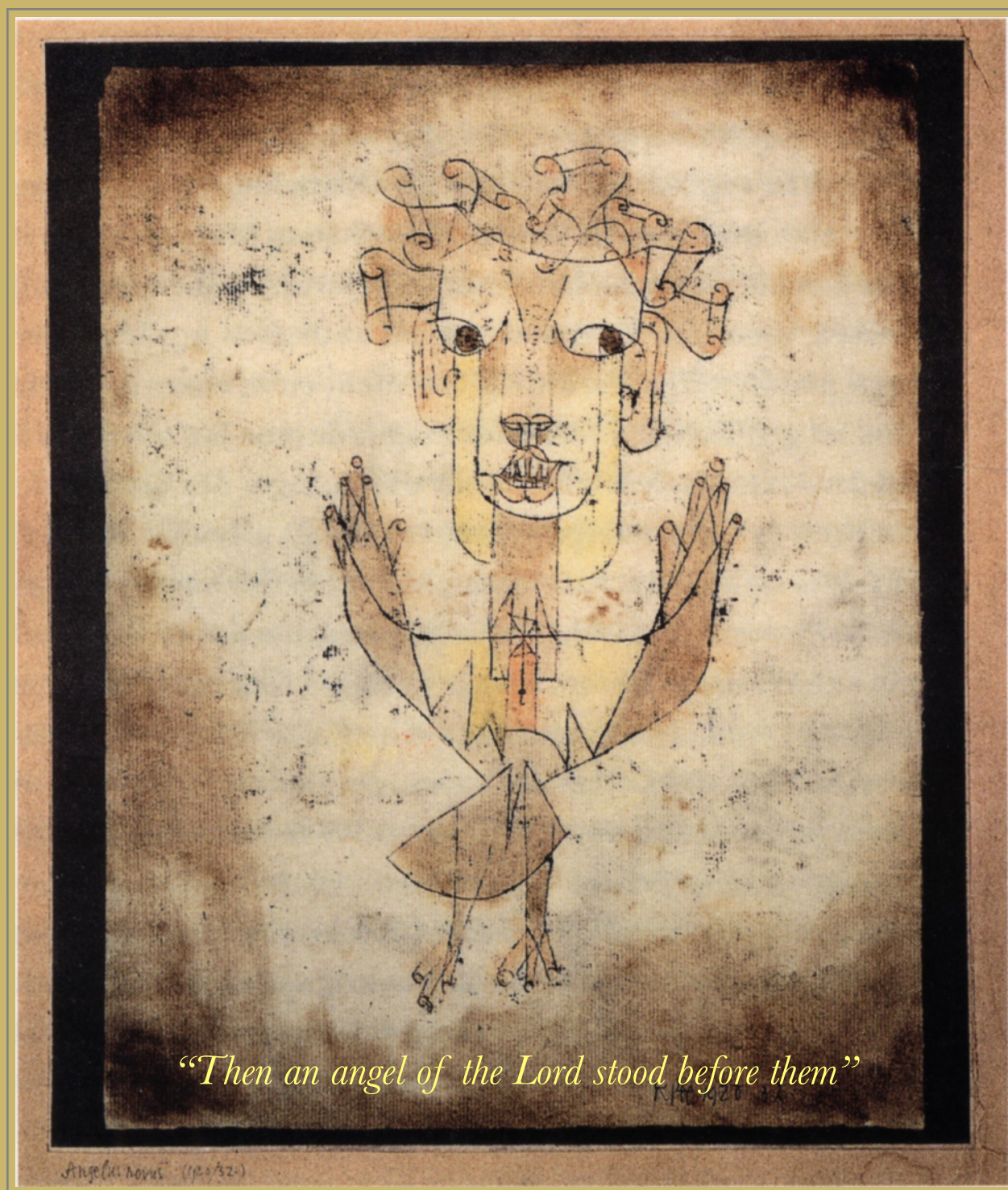


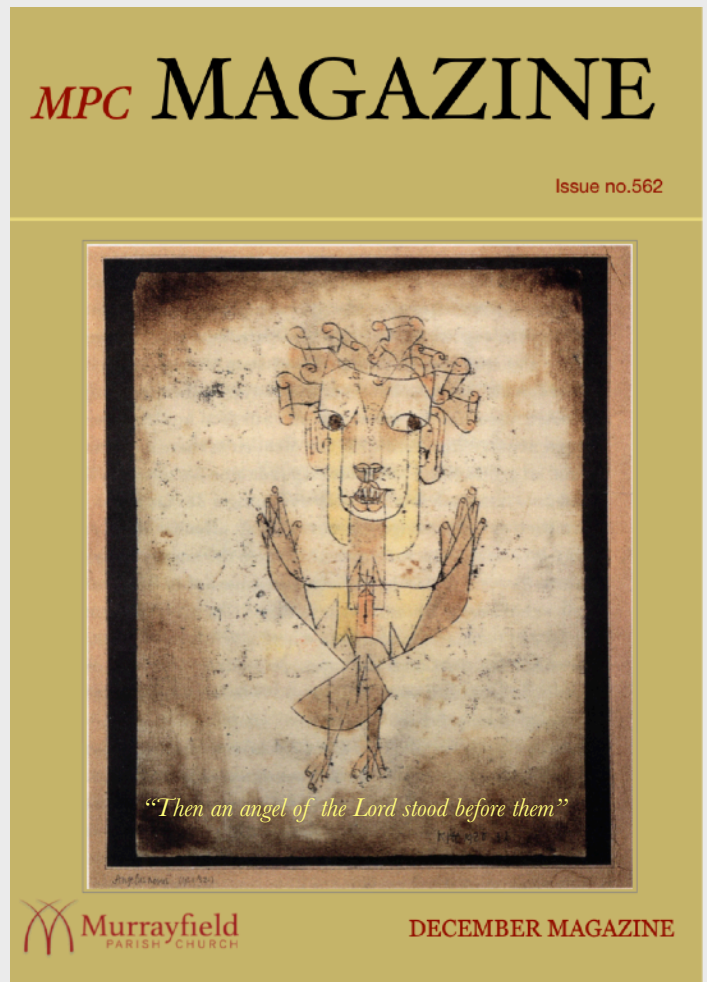

Minister's letter

“Sing to the Lord a new song ...Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it. **Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy before the Lord; for he is coming...**”.

The tradition, in recent years, in the parish church here at Murrayfield is to set up a Christmas tree for Advent Sunday. So this year the tree was lit on Sunday 30th November, and the tree will stay in situ until the New Year. Trees became a popular part of the celebration of Christmas in the Victorian era (originally with the royal family). They were increasingly adopted by the middle classes as part of decorating homes during the season. I am really curious if anyone remembers approximately when the practice began of installing a tree on the chancel inside the church?

In my childhood family home the setting up of the Christmas tree, in the living room, occurred on a weekend about three weeks before Christmas. I suspect that my brother and I were keen to have the tree up as soon as possible, and my parents had to hold firm in an attempt to rein in the excitement. These days Christmas comes earlier and earlier and it is not uncommon for people to have trees up from mid-November. Bars and restaurants often go early with their trees and lights, trying to create a Christmas vibe and for a busy period in the hospitality sector.



The Christmas tree in Trafalgar Square (gifted now for 78 years by City of Oslo) was turned on this year on Thursday 4th December. It will be taken down twelve days after Christmas (and recycled) on Monday 5th January. These days there is a Christmas Tree in the Vatican at St. Peter's Square. This year the tree comes from Bolzano in the Italian Alps. The lighting ceremony is on 7th December. This now popular tradition of the tree in St. Peter's Square was started in 1982 by Pope John Paul II. I wonder if the Murrayfield Church tree began around the same sort of time (or earlier? or later?).

Some Christians have been critical of Christmas trees, regarding them as having pagan origins. I think it is really helpful to be guided in this matter by Pope Benedict. He saw the tradition of the tree as a richly generative way of symbolising one of the theological aspects of Christmas. In one of his Christmas thoughts he references Psalm 96. He imagines the Christmas tree as a visible form of the praise offering in which the whole of creation sings a new song, and worships God for the birth of the saviour.

The Psalmist writes: "Sing to the Lord a new song ... Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice; let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it. Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy before the Lord; for he is coming...". Thinking of Christmas trees in this way gives them a performative function. To quote Benedict: "they point to the One who is the reason for our joy – the God who comes, the God who for our sake became a child. In the end, this song of praise, at the deepest level, speaks of him who is the very tree of new-found life."

I hope you will be able to enjoy worshipping around the church Christmas tree this December. The services that are planned are similar to in previous years. There is a Nativity Service on Sunday 14th December. On Sunday 21st there is a Lessons & Carols (with a slight variation on the preceding years). On Christmas Eve there is the popular 6pm service, and I will be grateful if you can remind as many of your neighbours as possible about this very accessible service! On Christmas Morning there is also a lovely service suitable for all ages.

In addition a daytime carol service is being trialled this year on Monday 22nd December at 2pm. The hope is that this might provide a good opportunity for those who don't want to come out in the dark, and for those who won't be able to make the Christmas morning celebration. This will be a short service with carols and a reflection. My colleague Rev. Douglas Nicol is taking the lead on this service and I trust many of you will be able to support it. There is also the promise of tea and cake afterwards.



Wishing you all the peace and joy that comes from knowing our Lord has come and is coming.

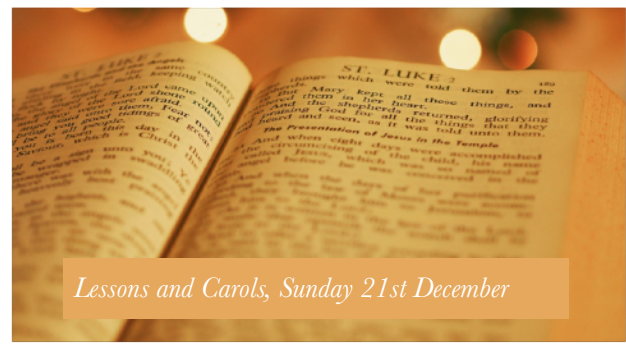

'WWW' sits alongside our very successful Tuesday exercise class: 'TTT', and helpful Bereavement Course which ran in the Autumn.

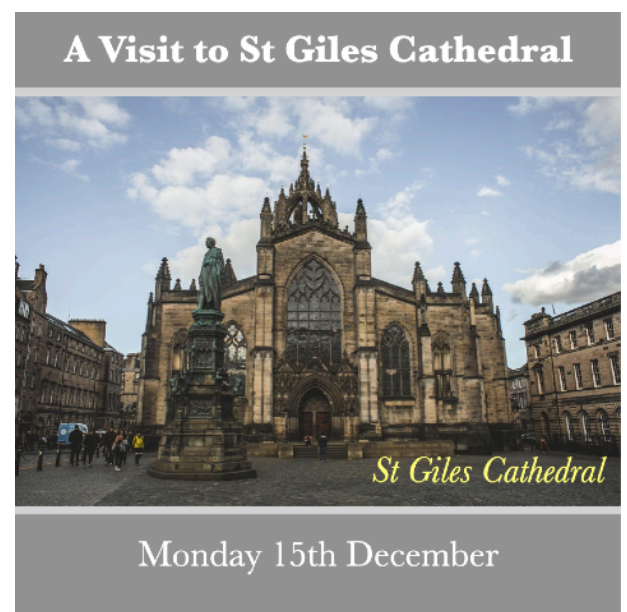

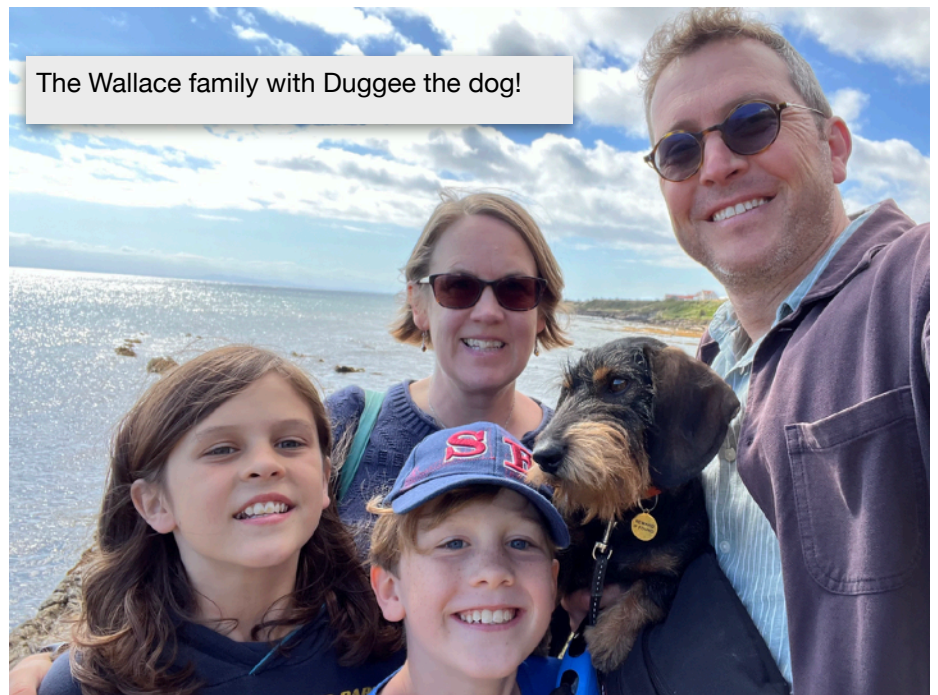


Ministry Candidate in Training

I'm only a month into my six-month placement, but already I've had the joy of meeting so many of you and discovering the rich variety of congregational life at Murrayfield Parish Church. From reflective Sunday morning services to sociable coffee in the hall. From the energy of Tone-up on Tuesdays at Two to the contemplative space offered by the Well-being Workshops and Worship. From the ecumenical spirit of Murrayfield Churches Together to the creativity of the young folk who enthusiastically join in Film Crew. Each encounter has been an insight into the richness of life within the church.

I am based in London with my family, and I am commuting to Edinburgh every other week for four to five days at a time for my training placement. I am splitting my time between my home congregation, where I continue my duties as an elder, beadle, and lunch team volunteer. It's a gathered congregation, with some members travelling over 50 miles to worship together, so it has been both fascinating and encouraging to experience the rhythms of parish life here at Murrayfield and to notice the similarities and differences between the two settings. Part of our formation involves immersing ourselves in a range of contexts in preparation for future ministry, so I am enjoying the opportunity to learn.



I am currently in my second year of training as a candidate for ministry. I have one more placement after this, a 10-week summer placement, before going on to a 15-month probationary placement. Alongside placement life, I am also entering the final phase of my theology degree, with my dissertation deadline beginning to loom on the horizon!

Thank you for welcoming my family and me so warmly into your community. I look forward to the months ahead and to sharing in the life of Murrayfield Parish Church.

A Visit to South Korea

I recently visited Busan in South Korea at the invitation of the Presbytery of Busan South.

They were due to have some commemorative events celebrating the contribution of my great grandfather Rev John Ross. Back in the late 1800's he was a missionary in Manchuria which shared a border with Korea. The Korean gate was closed to foreigners at that time, other than Chinese merchants. John Ross befriended some Chinese and Korean merchants and learned Hangul from the Koreans. He persuaded them to help him to translate the Gospels of Luke and John into Hangul. He then persuaded the Scottish Bible Society to print copies of these books and the Korean and Chinese merchants smuggled them back through the Korean Gate, page by page, with routine letters written on the other side in case they were inspected at the border. It became known as the "Jesus Bible" and in this way, Christianity was first made known to the Korean people. It grew exponentially and South Korea now has a thriving Protestant Church and by far the largest Christian population in Asia³



The Ross family received an extremely warm and gracious welcome in Busan and we enjoyed sharing worship at various churches (not the 5am services thankfully), addressed the Presbytery meeting, visited a school, a university, an art gallery and a hospital and we were interviewed on the radio and by a local newspaper. It was very humbling to see and hear the gratitude, respect and affection they still hold for our great grandfather and to receive so many thoughtful and personal gifts from strangers. We visited a fascinating Christian museum at Dongnae Central Church which told the story of evangelisation of countries across the world and there we saw a copy of the original handwritten gospels that John Ross produced. We also met with descendants of a Korean man who had been baptised and made an elder by our great grandfather and whose family has greatly valued their Christian faith through the generations. They had flown in from Texas especially to meet us.

Koreans are energetic and committed church members and excellent singers so I will try to recruit some in Edinburgh for Murrayfield Parish Church!



Murrayfield Churches Together: Faith Discussion Group

The group has met for many years at Saughtonhall United Reformed Church on a Tuesday evening. We are a small number of people from each of the three Churches which comprise the Murrayfield Churches Together. We are evenly balanced between women and men all with considerable commitment to their own churches and significantly to one another. Most are 'retired ' but, when free, those not retired do drop in whenever they can. This has included those directly involved in Christian Ministry within Murrayfield Churches Together.

A bi product of Covid has been that the Faith Discussion Group use Zoom to allow those who are no longer able to comfortably get together in person to continue to actively participate. As a consequence whatever the time of year, or the weather, the numbers participating are remarkably steady. Normally we have about twelve each week out of about eighteen interested participants.

Our role is to enhance our own faith by studying the Bible using a range of contemporary material to which all of us have access.

During the last ten weeks we have covered the first seven chapters of John's Gospel which has enabled us to dip our toes into Johns theology. The meaning of his message lies in and around and below each word of the text. It probes the ongoing challenge for all of us as we travel a journey of faith and its obvious that Jesus' message, should have a fundamental impact on every part of our lives - not just what we do but why we do it and how. We will take this task further from the 6th of January through to Easter 2026. Discussions are lively and worthy of careful reflection so we may not ever complete it!

The values which direct our interpersonal lives are challenged by the alternative deep personal relationship between God and mankind presented by Johns message. How do we reconcile our earthly values governed by our complex existence with the most important gift - the all encompassing love of God for us.

It has been an exciting and successful year for our MCT support for Esther's school and the women's projects.

The Elizabeth Forbes computer room has been finished and is now up and running with tables , chairs, wiring and computers and is being used by the whole school.

This has been funded by the legacy left from Betty Forbes and also from Murrayfield Churches Together Christmas funding from last year. With this funding we were able to help to complete the room and the purchase of more computers.

The women continue to work at making all kinds of goods for us to sell, bags, jewellery, aprons, etc, at the various sales we have done this year.

The sale at Roseburn school in June, CoGS and SURC also sold gifts over the summer have added a good few hundred pounds to our Ecludare account.

We have just sent Esther £1.000 for the pre Christmas chapatti flour and food parcels for the families and elderly in the village.

The school has just had an end of year graduation ceremony. Children moving on to the next level, from preschool, lower school and primary - the school goes up to Junior Secondary. Some of the older children are moving on to Senior school.

As you are no doubt aware the Congregation ran a Stewardship campaign during October 2025. There were a number of reasons for this. Firstly, some time had elapsed since the last campaign which was run prior to the Covid pandemic. It is suggested by the Church of Scotland that a campaign should be run every three years. Secondly, as was detailed in the Stewardship documentation which was delivered to members, the congregation was running a deficit of around £26,000 with income from offerings declining over the last ten years. If we were able to increase our income from offerings, it would obviously assist in addressing this. However, an increase in offerings will also enable the Congregation to continue our mission work in the Murrayfield community with pastoral initiatives for older members such as TTT, WWW, and the employment of Rev Douglas Nicol as a pastoral assistant. In addition, it might go a long way to the Congregation being able to attract a families and youth worker.

At the time of preparing this article, it is too early to provide any indication as to the results of our campaign. However, at this stage I would like to express my sincere thanks to those who have responded positively to the campaign. Your responses will assist the Congregation in achieving at least some of the goals of the campaign.

In writing this article, I am fairly certain that there will be members who have not as yet responded to the campaign. I say this without any hint of admonition. I fully understand that we all receive so many communications in hard copy and electronic form these days. We often put them aside or save them fully intending to do something about it but somehow not quite getting round to it! The fact that the campaign has now ended does not mean your contribution will not be most welcome. It may just make the difference between all as opposed to some of the goals being achieved. So if you have not quite found the time to respond, have a read of the leaflet which was delivered during the campaign and consider if you would be able to assist. Go on, before Christmas is upon us. I hope you and everyone at Murrayfield Parish are doing well. My name is Tamsin and I'm part of the fundraising team at Edinburgh Food Project. I wanted to say thank you for all you've done to help local foodbanks. Your parish has been a wonderful supporter over the years, and we're so grateful for your kindness and generosity. The total donations from your community amount to an impressive 3,526.1kg, which is about the weight of a hippo! Your congregation and team make a real difference, providing emergency food parcels to those across Edinburgh who are struggling to put food on the table. In 2024, gifts like yours helped ensure 19,734 food parcels contained enough breakfast, lunch and dinner over three days, supporting 5,726 people in need. Many of the people you have helped are experiencing homelessness or insecure housing, or have a disability or long-term health condition. Many are families with children. As the holiday season approaches, bringing with it festive lights, Christmas trees, songs, and fun, there will be thousands struggling to provide for their families, being forced to turn to foodbanks. Your donations make a huge difference to people in difficult circumstances.
