FAIRTRADE

This year in September I attended the Scottish Fairtrade Conference in Dundee. It was great to see so many supporters of fairtrade from all over Scotland. We were welcomed by the Lord Provost of Dundee. Murrayfield Parish Church was one of four churches represented at the conference. Along with a reception at the Scottish Parliament earlier this year, the conference has really helped strengthen our connection with Fairtrade communities around the country and beyond.

We met Fairtrade business owners, ethical campaigners, fairtrade educators as well as producers from Malawi and Rwanda. The producers were able to give us very positive stories about the impact Fairtrade has had on their communities.

The theme of the conference was that our ethical decisions and choices give us the ability to change lives, and that small groups of people can have a huge impact. Scotland has been a Fairtrade nation for ten years and the, now well

recognised, Fairtrade trademark has been around for thirty years. There is

much wider engagement globally with Fairtrade. It was interesting to reflect on how Fairtrade principles interconnect with other social justice movements and that these principles are closely intertwined with environmental issues. It was lovely to hear that faith organisations are recognised as having been at the forefront of

the fairtrade movement, the movement started within churches with Christian Aid and Tearcraft being early adopters.

Thank you to everyone who continues to support the Fairtrade Stall, know that you are making a difference to improve the lives of producers around the world. Lots of you have kindly bought Christmas gifts and Advent calendars. I intend to have another stall on Sunday 10th December.

NEWS FROM STEWART GILLAN, St Andrews Church of Scotland, Jerusalem

Dear Friends

Listening to Faure's Requiem will not bring you closer to Gaza, but it might bring you closer to yourself. Hearing it as a lament not for one person but for hundreds, running to thousands since the 7th of October. Kyrie eleison, the voices sing. Lord have mercy. Yes, upon us all.

Many of you, in your encouraging messages of support as we made our way, Muriel and I, overland from Jerusalem to Amman, and then by air to Abu Dhabi and London, before reaching Glasgow at midnight on Friday 13th, gave thanks for our safe return and then added words that told us you knew it had not been easy for us to leave. Leave parishioners, partners, friends and colleagues behind – some of whom had chosen to stay, many more of whom had no choice.

We came out with volunteers from the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel, and three Methodist colleagues, Dave, Bea and Lynne. Praying prayers of gratitude and grief, and for a ceasefire, refusing to be told it was too early for such a prayer. A significant moment along the way was the short trip from the Israeli side of Sheikh Hussein bridge to the Jordanian side. For five shekels, and an exit doc, you bus it across the River Jordan. 'It is the wise decision,' said my friend Jim, drawing on years of experience as a chaplain to the forces. 'Often they are the ones that hurt most.'



I have arrived not all at once. Happy to see Sarah and the kids at the airport, but not happy to be home like this. I am forgetting where I left the keys. Letting cups of coffee go cold. Trying to find my way around our new flat – we had only just moved.

Watching the news out of Gaza and Israel, the Czech philosopher Jan Patočka came to mind. He spoke of those who are shaken by their experience in this world, and called for a new political community to be formed: the solidarity of the shaken. I used to think it a good idea, but for others, the shaken ones, to build. I no longer place myself outside it.

So, we are here. But how might we be usefully here? Muriel and I are keeping up with the St Andrew's community on our WhatsApp group and on zoom, checking in, telling stories, joining in prayer, comparing notes. Daily prayers at 7 in the morning in the immediate aftermath of the Hamas attacks on Israeli civilians have given way to Sunday Worship online at 10.00am Jerusalem time, and prayers at 7.00pm on Wednesdays. The blast at Al Ahli Episcopal Hospital shook us all up, sending us to prayer in extremis from different sides of the wall. We are a diverse congregation, which presents challenges and opportunities for understanding what we are going through respectively before the Lord. In its Statement, the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, quoted the Apostle Paul to the Church in Corinth, 'We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed ... struck down, but not destroyed.'

Working with Kenny Roger and Rebecca McGonigle at Faith Action, and Carol Finlay and team, we wish to connect with you in the days and weeks to come. It is not possible to know how long the war will run, but at the moment it looks possible to plan visits and events in Presbyteries and congregations. We would love to meet you, check in, join in prayer, and see what we might be able to do together, including communicating with partners and colleagues in Israel, Gaza and Palestine, and advocacy with our governments here concerning their policy on the war and the protection of Christian communities.



Muriel has listed the following prayer points in her letter, which I share with you:

- Pray for leadership to move beyond the current crisis
- Pray for all who have lost loved ones or have been injured
- Pray for a cease fire and humanitarian aid
- Pray for all those Israelis and Palestinians, displaced from their homes
- or who have lost their jobs overnight
- Pray for all those seeking to find ways to be a 'human' in the face
- of great humanity
- Pray for staff at the Scots Hotel, the St Andrew's House Hotel and Tabeetha School
- Continue to pray for peace with justice.

Through these days, may we be to each other in the power of the Holy Spirit, strength in need, comfort in sorrow, and companions on this journey of spiritual communion and mission partnership with our friends and colleagues in Israel and Palestine.






Can you help?

A tribute to Janis Curran: 7th October-5th February 2023

Memories from Dr John Crispin

The Murrayfield Ghana partnership was very important to Janis and she became a staunch supporter. The partnership, which lasted over twenty years, linked Murrayfield Parish Church with Kwamebikrom, a village of over 3,000 people situated in the Western part of the Ghana rain forest.

It was during the planning process for our February 1999 trip to Kwamebikrom that Janis first volunteered to be one of Murrayfield's travelling team. On that return journey it was suggested that she should sit in the window seat on the plane as the views of the Sahara were spectacular. Why did she refuse? She had a fear of heights!! That fear did not defer her however from returning to the village a further 5 times, with her last trip being in 2010. She was particularly pleased when her son, Daniel, joined the visiting group in 2008.

Janis became a good friend and travelling companion to all who had the privilege to travel with her to Ghana; she was quietly competent, empowered by her experience in children's welfare. Her presence as a caring member of Murrayfield's congregation with her ability to relate to many people in Kwamebikrom of all ages did a great deal to cement the friendship between our two communities. She was very much part of the Murrayfield team.

We have a series of pictures of her walking about the village, always elegant, and often in traditional Ghanaian dress. Walking about in the village was an activity that was dear to her heart; she was then able to talk to the people and show a genuine interest in their daily lives. She was never happier than when she could join the visiting teachers from Roseburn Primary school and spend a day in the Edinburgh Unity Presbyterian school talking with the children.

Janis was always active in supporting any fund-raising projects carried out by Murrayfield's congregation on behalf of Kwamebikrom, giving of her time and talents without complaint. Whenever Murrayfield hosted visits from members of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana or from Kwamebikron itself, to Edinburgh, she was always happy to play her part.

I asked Bill Brown, our Minister at the time, and someone who had been a travelling companion, for his thoughts on Janis's contribution to the partnership and I quote from his reply:

"As in her professional life, it was her compassion which shone through. She had a real empathy and sensitivity which enabled her to get close to people. This extended well beyond a listening ear and kind words, to practical support for some individuals which she sustained quietly over the years.

I am sure that is why she kept wanting to return, each time being encouraged by the changes and improvements in people's lives. She stands out as one who truly embraced the concept and content of the Murrayfield Ghana partnership and, as in her daily profession, she changed lives for the better". We can only echo his words.

A tribute to Christina (Ena) Scott : 20th November 1925- 2nd November 2023 Memories from Dr Jane Crispin

Ena was a unique Lady. Murrayfield Parish Church was her Church from age three years until her death. Ena would have been 98 years old on her birthday 20th November 2023. There were six different ministers during these years. J. Rosie Brown and HG Budge are but names to most of us but Ena knew them all, George Sangster, Clarence Musgrave, Bill Brown and now Keith Graham.

Ena was a well known lady in Murrayfield Parish Church and was always immaculate with a ready very open and welcoming smile for those she knew and new people coming to our Church for the first time. Ena became a member of MPC in her teens and became a Sunday School Teacher in 1969. When I joined her as a teacher in 1978 she, Doreen Dakers and Moira Simpson were already there. Norman Robb was superintendent at that time. Ena was very popular with the children and other teachers.

Ena served on the Congregational Board before becoming an Ordained Elder in 1978. She was Board Convener for 7 years. When Ena was inducted as an Elder she was only the sixth Lady Elder to be ordained in Murrayfield Parish Church. Ena then served on the congregational Board as one of the elected elders to the Board and was on the Hospitality sub committee of the Board. She was always there when help was needed with hospitality and attended and helped at fundraising coffee mornings, sales of work and other Church events. Each Christmas Ena was in attendance to hand out mince pies after the Watchnight services over very many years.

Ena was assiduous in carrying out her pastoral care as a District Elder and was a regular visitor to those in residential care. To quote one of our members "Ena was a great organiser". Ena ran the Lighthearts with members from Murrayfield Parish Church but also Saughtonhall Church and the community. This was a group of friends in retirement from 1986 for very many years. It involved arranging a lady to run a Keep Fit Class, ensure lunch was made, initially by the ladies themselves, then by Dove Cafe volunteers such as Edith Connor, Mary Murray, Sheila and Gordon Miller and Margaret Harris. Ena had many willing helpers. After lunch had been enjoyed, she organised a quiz.

Ena was in charge of the finances. When the members were younger retirees, Ena and her friend Betty Hurley organised days out, by bus to many places including Perth, for the ladies. Ena and Betty encouraged others to "volunteer" to come and help on those occasions. Ena and Betty organised the Lighthearts' Christmas lunches in local hotels. However, when they were less able, the Christmas lunches were held in Murrayfield Parish Church hall....more willing volunteers to cook and to serve, play the piano and lead Carol singing.

Ena organised the Indoor Monday morning bowling club, again over very many years and she made sure no one spent too long over coffeethe bowling was the priority!

The Forth Road Bridge walk was another of Ena's and the Lighthearts' projects, to raise money for Christian Aid. No one was allowed to opt out of their fund raising, everyone when asked just signed the form and supported the charity. When the other ladies no longer felt able to do the walk, due to their health deteriorating, Ena found others to accompany her. She also enjoyed attending the Christian Aid quiz evenings and was a keen and knowledgeable contestant.

Martha Dickson recalls that for many years Ena organised, distributed and kept track of collections on behalf of of the Blind Society via Sooty, Sweep and Basil Brush models outside the shops at Shandwick Place and Roseburn. Ena was one of the volunteers at The Abbeyfield Residential house...Mill House in Roseburn. She accompanied them on outings as a helper and was a regular visitor to the residents.

When a Junior Choir was mooted and established in the 90s responsible adults were required. Ena volunteered and attended every practice and every Sunday when they sang as a choir.


Murrayfield Parish Church ran services in Struan lodge Care Home where Ena was Regular helper. She also helped hand out hymn books in Murrayfield Care home when she became a resident there. She loved those services, especially when unable to attend Murrayfield Parish Church. Her first love however, was to attend morning service at her beloved Murrayfield Parish Church, which she did until she became too infirm to travel safely by car from the Care Home.

You will have gathered that Ena was an invaluable church member, elder and friend to so very many until her health deteriorated after her 90th Birthday - this she celebrated with her many friends from Murrayfield Parish Church and other friends with an afternoon tea.

She was a very generous supporter of Murrayfield Parish Church finances as well as giving of her time and talents so freely. Ena had the foresight to be able to decide where she would like to spend her last years when unable to care for herself. She chose to put her name down for Murrayfield House Care home, having visited all the others in the area. The Staff at Murrayfield House Care Home were very fond of Ena and she of them. This meant that she was cared for with love and affection over her increasing physical and mental deterioration until her death on November 2nd having suffered stroke a few days prior to this. Rest in peace Ena after a long and very full life where your faith meant that your Church was always centre stage.
