

The celebration of Eric Liddell's life at Holy Corner and recording a radio programme that was played last Sunday morning was a profound experience that left me completely transformed. His values and principles are an inspiration, and I will strive to emulate them in my own life and work.



My visit to St. Giles Cathedral was equally impactful. The rich history preserved within the church, particularly the stories of those who gave their lives for the sake of the gospel, was deeply moving.

CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF FRESH START



This year marks a significant milestone for Fresh Start as we celebrate our 25th anniversary. For a quarter of a century, Fresh Start has been a pillar of support for those who have experienced homelessness, helping thousands rebuild their lives by settling into a new home and their community

Founded in 1999, Fresh Start was established with a mission to help people who have been homeless to make a home for themselves. Over the years, the charity has grown exponentially, expanding its services and programs to meet the evolving demands of the community. From our flagship program the 'Starter Packs' to our social and practical services such as painting, cooking and gardening to providing food and advice through our community hub. Fresh Start has made tangible difference to the lives of countless individuals.

The impact of Fresh Start can be seen best in the stories of those we have helped over the years. Individuals like Liz, who first came to fresh Start after hearing about the volunteering opportunities available from the Volunteer Centre on Leith Walk. She was homeless living in accommodation at the time, and wanted to be involved in something that gave her routine, purpose and a step towards employment again.


Liz got stuck into volunteering in our warehouse and loved being part of the team. After over six months of bidding on tenancies. she was luckily offered a one bedroom, ground floor flat - she was over the moon! However after months of living in a hostel and with little belongings the new flat felt like an empty shell. Thankfully we were able to provide Liz with a full range of Starter Packs of essential household items to help get her started. We also applied for funding for Liz which meant she could fully carpet the entire flat which made a huge difference to making it feel warm and homely. Liz continues to volunteer with Fresh Start delivering Starter Packs to people, like her, in need of help getting started in their new home after being homeless. Liz said "I enjoy volunteering for Fresh Start and by delivering the Starter Packs it feels like my way of giving back in the same way that I was helped when I needed We are delighted that we could play a small part in getting Liz back on her feet and wish her all the very best in her new Fresh Start's remarkable journey wouldn't be possible without the generosity of its supporters. Whether through volunteering, donating or participating in fundraising events, there are many ways to get involved and contribute. We would like to say a heartfelt thank you to all who have been involved and supported us over the last 25 years - we couldn't have done it without you.

Here's what Managing Director Biddy Kelly has to say about Fresh Start turning 25.

"On one hand, providing services to those in need for 25 years is a great achievement, but on the other hand it is a bad reflection of our world today. In the last few years we have seen demand for all our services grow year on year. We have ended the last few years being amazed at the amount we have achieved and always thinking we cannot keep that up in the following year - but the following year we do - because we need to provide people with the hope for a better future. That's what all our staff and volunteers do each and every day and I can't thank each and every one of them enough for their continued support".

A joint statement from Stewart Gillan and Muriel Pearson, Mission Partners in the Middle East.

New Alarm at the Extension of the Administrative Detention of Layan Nasir, a 23 year-old Palestinian Anglican woman held without charge since 6 April 2024

'Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured.' Hebrews 13.3, NRSV

'I have just had bad news that Layan's detention has been extended for a further four months. Very upsetting.' So reports Richard Sewell this morning,



Dean of St George's College in East Jerusalem, replying to our request today for an update on Layan Nasir.

Three weeks ago, we learned that an Israeli Military judge had denied

an appeal for her release. An Action Alert issued by the US Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations on 11 July voiced deep concern in about the manner in which Layan was taken, her ongoing detention, and the broader system of administrative detention that means many thousands of Palestinians are kept in custody for months, their families barred from visiting. Writing on 12 July, the Rev Dr Don Binder, Chaplain to Hosam Naoum, Archbishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and Primate of the Anglican Communion in the Middle East, provided background to Layan's story. 'Back in April, Nasir's mother, Lulu Nasir, told Sky News that soldiers arrived at the family's home at 4am on April 6 and threatened them with guns as they searched the house before taking her daughter into custody. Israel hasn't given any reason for Nasir's detention. She is being held at Damon Prison near Haifa.'

Layan is a member of St Peter's Anglican Church in the Occupied West Bank city of Birzeit. No timeline for charges, trial or release has been set in her case. Nasir's priest, the Rev Fadi Diab, and her family have been barred from visiting her. Israel has arrested more than 9,700 Palestinians from the West Bank since the Israel-Hamas war started in October 2023, according to Addameer, a Palestinian prisoner support and human rights NGO based in Ramallah in the West Bank.

Call for prayer and advocacy:

We join with Layan's family (mother Lulu, father Sami, twin brother Basil), her Church (the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, our partner), and fellow students at Birzeit University on the West Bank, in requesting that you remember Layan and her fellow detainees in prayer.

We appeal to you to write letters to your MSPs and MPs to advocate for her release and, while her detention continues, for her family and Rev Diab to be allowed to visit her.

A conversation in June with Archbishop Hosam saw him emphasise the point that Layan is being held in administrative detention, urging that we call for an end to detention without charge.

Can we remember Layan and her fellow detainees as though we were in Damon prison with them? Let us be bold to take up this call, remembering with humility that we rest in the power of the Holy Spirit, as we search for the words to say.

well as the Murrayfield Club members. We look forward to many years of shared use and fun with it.





Ian Graham: GAPP




